MEMORIAL INSCRIPTIONS IN ST GEORGE'S CHURCH AND CHURCHYARD

DAMERHAM 1999

A significant research project was completed by Mr Philip Crampton of Woodmans Yard, Damerham in October 1999. He has catalogued the memorial inscriptions of 660 people of Damerham. They range from the 18th Century to the present day and cover people of all ages from 11 weeks to 100 years old. A further 10 inscriptions are no longer legible due to the effects of weather.

The original churchyard is roughly circular with its centre in the middle of the chancel with an area of exactly 1 acre. In 1896 the first burial took place in newly consecrated ground of approximately $1/3^{\rm rd}$ of an acre. In 1941 a further extension was made which increased the size to approximately 2 acres. First burials in the new churchyard were those of the four private soldiers who were killed on $9^{\rm th}$ May 1941 by an explosion at the munitions dump on the Martin road. They were buried together with full military honours.

The contents of Mr Crampton's research have been transferred onto a computer and the following pages contain a précis of that research, since space does not permit a full listing. The tables show the specific location on the maps, type of memorial, names and relationship where known, dates of burial or memorial and ages at that time for every readable inscription.
