PERSONAL DETAILS

Names in the booklet are listed alphabetically by parish and by conflict. Personal details show:

Rank - Name

Service Number - Service¹ or Army Regiment. Officers did not have Service numbers in World War 1.

Date of death.

Infantry regiments have been abbreviated. For example: '1st Wiltshires' is short for '1st Battalion The Wiltshire Regiment'.

FORMATIONS AND UNITS

A number of formations and units are described. Their World War 1 strengths were very approximately:

Division - 20,000 ² men (3 or 4 brigades).	Company - 230 men (3 - 4 in each battalion).
Brigade - 5,000 men (3 - 4 in a division).	Platoon - 50 men (3 - 4 in a company).
Battalion - 1,000 men (3- 4 in a brigade).

DECORATIONS

There are three gallantry decorations listed in the booklet:

Military Cross (MC)



The Military Cross was instituted in 1914. It was issued for gallantry in presence of

the enemy to warrant and junior officers of the Army.

Military Medal (MM)



The Military Medal was instituted in 1916. It was the equivalent of the MC for

the other ranks (nonofficers) of the Army for gallantry on land in presence of the enemy.

Air Force Cross (AFC)



Instituted in 1918, the Air Force Cross was issued for acts of gallantry while flying on nonactive

operations to warrant officers and officers of the Royal Air Force.
