Damerham Fair

Funding requests have been received and agreed with our independent reviewers and the committee. We are very pleased that the success of the Fair has enabled us to help a wide variety of organisations. We are part funding the school's new shaded play area; the Sportsfield's new boiler; Tea and Chat's Christmas meal; free lunches (see below); setting up a Sunday lunch club and helping the Horticultural Society with Fair running costs. In addition, we are funding some equipment for the Avon Valley Shed; materials/quest for the craft club and kickboard for the Damerham Village Kids. These are on top of funding the cleaning of the war memorials; purchasing the dog poo bin on the Sportsfield and a safer drinks hot water system in the Pavilion.

Planning for the 2024 event is progressing well. The Black Eagles (a fantastic gymnastic display) being the main arena attraction and the evening band will be performing music from the 6o's, 70's and 8o's. We will also be putting on the popular free bus service from Fordingbridge again.

Nature Notes From Paul T.

Weather in November: Another wet month with 115mm of rain compared with the average of 85mm. We have had 948mm in the past 12 months. There were just 8 dry days, a 'mini drought' in the middle of the month, with 5 successive days without rain. There were 3 days when the temperature reached 15C and the average maximum was 12C. I recorded just 3 frosts although I know other places in the village had more. The lowest temperature here was zero on 26/27th and 27/28th. The average minimum was 6C. The river is really high, lovely to see it flowing so well. Wildlife: Alec and I went to Blashford Lakes one evening to look for a Starling roost and there were several thousand birds coming in at dusk, although they did not perform for long, going quickly in to roost. It is well worth a visit. There were as usual thousands of gulls roosting with a river of Lesser Black Backs coming in as dusk fell as well as lots of Black Headed Gulls and fewer Common Gulls. I have found a lot of fungi including Shaggy Parasols and some really huge mushrooms which have recently been named Macro Mushrooms. As the vegetation died down, I found 2 summer nests of Harvest Mice in our field. The first I have seen for a few years. I was very pleased to find that they are still there. There have been very few birds in the garden until right at the end of the month, when masses of Blue Tits and Great Tits started on the sunflower seeds with a few Coal Tits and very rarely a Marsh Tit. No Gold

I have seen 2 articles recently about dead leaves in the garden one by the curator at Wisley and the other by James Wong in the New Scientist. They remind me of a piece I wrote a few years back in The Gate. I mentioned then how the decline of Blackbirds in urban parks was linked to the clearing away of leaves, from not just the grass, but from flower beds as well, which has become popular with the adent of the dreaded leaf blower. Blackbirds in particular spend a lot of the winter foraging among dead leaves for worms and other invertebrates, and clearing them away takes a lot of their food away. Both these articles highlighted how research has shown that no harm would come to your tulips or other dormant plants under a cover of leaves as they are all taken down into the ground over winter by worms, with a huge increase in the worms and an improvement in the soil as a result. Even on lawns, it has been shown that a 50% cover is fine, and that the best way to manage the leaves is to break them up with the mower and leave them for the worms. This is, after all, just a natural mulch. The Wisley curator also mentioned that he had given up digging the beds in winter, and thus spared his back! So resist the temptation of the leaf blower and leave the leaves for the wildlife. Happy Spotting. Paul.
