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#### Nature Notes From Paul T.

**Weather December 2023**: Very wet again, with the month's rainfall at 144mm compared with the average of 95mm. There were 9 dry days, and only one morning when there was no cloud. 28 days had complete cloud cover at 8am. The warmest day was on the  $21^{st}$  with 14C, and the coldest was -2C on the  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$ . There were just 3 frosts.

**Wildlife in December**: As a result of the dismal wet weather and the interruption of Christmas, I have no records for the month, apart from recording the first Goldfinches of the winter early in the month. I can't remember this happening before.

Alec and I visited the Somerset Levels earlier in January to watch the Starlings room on the RSPB reserve at Ham Walls. Although there were an estimated 500,000 birds coming in at dusk, it was not one of the best displays I have seen. Birds went in as they arrived in large flocks, and never got together in the vast clouds you sometimes see. If you have never been to watch it, it is certainly worth a trip.

Even without the Starlings, it is still a great experience with Marsh Harriers constantly patrolling, Great White Egrets, Little Egrets and Herons to watch, and thousands of ducks. These were mainly Shoveler and Gadwall, but there were also Tufted Duck, Mallard and Teal. Lots of Coot, a few Great Crested Grebe and Little Grebe. We heat Water Rail squealing in the reed beds and saw Snipe, Stone Chat and Reed Bunting. There were Robins everywhere, and a Sparrow Hawk flew over as the sky darkened. The Somerset Levels and Moors as they are officially called, have a fascinating history. Covering about 160,000 hectare, most of the area is very low lying - just 3 or 4 metres above sea level, and Neolithic people lived here in raised villages with wooden trackways to aid getting about. The Sweet Track is the most famous and some of this is preserved by preventing it from drying out. In the Middle Ages some drainage was done by constructing ditches, but it was not until efficient steam driven pumps were available in the 1860's that large areas were drained with water pumped up to raised artificial rivers.

Digging of peat has been done for hundreds of years, but in the mid 20<sup>th</sup> Century the introduction of huge machines enabling vast amounts to be taken and huge areas of herb-rich grassland were consumed. In recent years, the extraction is much reduced, and now the area is a wonderful complex of open water, reed beds and grazing land. Willow growing was very important for basket making until plastic took over, and in the 1930's about 9,000 acres were in use. Now less than 300 acres are still actively managed. Over the years, there have been disastrous floods, and in 1607, over 2,000 people were drowned and 200 square miles were under water. The most famous (or infamous, perhaps) of recent times, was in 2013/14 when over 600 houses were flooded and villages were cut off for weeks.
