<u>Paul T's Nature Notes</u> <u>Weather October 2025</u>

I was surprised to find that the rainfall was average for the month with 75mm (average 71mm) There were 16 dry days and the rainfall over the past 12 months is now 738mm. The long term average is 943mm! The average maximum was 19C and

the warmest day was 22nd with 20C Average minimum was 9C and coldest nights were 25/26th and 26/27th at 3C. I did not record a frost but there may have been one those nights.

Wildlife

We still had no birds visiting the garden apart from 1 Blue-tit in mid October. However, I did a Winter Bird Survey visit mid month and recorded a lot of birds around Southend and Mill End including Siskin. I did at last see Lizard and Slow-worm in our field. I had a response to my last report as Mike Jerrard told me he found masses of hatched Grass Snake eggs on his compost heap. Hopefully many will survive hibernation and we may see more next year. Fungi have been abundant, and on a visit to Langley Wood we found the ground covered with hundreds of Boletus (the ones with sponge underneath instead of gills) of many species, and many other types including the beautiful Fly Agarics. A visit to the New Forest produced a list of 71 species. During lunch break at a singing workshop in Witchampton a female Sparrowhawk was seen to kill a Wood Pigeon and proceed to pluck and eat it in the church yard perhaps a bit gruesome for some, but quite exciting especially as we were able to get very close to it. We used to see hundreds of gulls flying south over the village in late afternoons but rarely see this now, presumably because we are no longer on the flight line from Blashford to the food source. The gulls that we see here in the village are usually either Lesser-black Backs, the large ones, or Black-headed Gulls which are much smaller with black heads in summer and no black on their backs. In early October in Charlton All Saints a recently cultivated field had about 300 Common Gulls feeding. They aren't common here and the name is misleading. Then in late October a flock of about 140 Common Gulls suddenly flew in to a grass field in the village in late afternoon. Probably resting on their way to roost at Blashford. A really surprising record was finding a Glow-worm larva in the pond in our field in October. I rescued it and perhaps I will see one glowing next summer. This is only the second record for the field in 12 years. Glow worms are actually beetles and larvae and adult females look a bit like ladybird larvae. During the summer the females spend the daytime down in the grass and then at night crawl up grass stems, switch on the light and wait for the males to arrive. The males are small black beetles and fly around looking for the glowing females. They are guite common on chalk grassland areas as the larvae feed on snails, particularly Banded Snails. They secrete a digestive fluid which turns the snail into a soup which they then ingest. We sometimes attracted dozens of the males to our moth light on Martin Down.

Bridleway update.

I started the move to improve the Damerham/Sandleheath bridleway a few years ago so as to enable easy walking/riding/cycling for all between the villages. With the help of two local farmers, David Bryant and Rob Cobb and a small outlay, a surface was laid at the Damerham end. A Manager from the HCC Countryside Department came to view and was impressed with the efforts and we discussed the rest of the Bridleway and how the connection for the two villages would be very positive. From Sandleheath, the paths can be picked up to walk to Fordingbridge creating a great access network. He successfully applied for CIL funding from NFDC, and the work has started to improve the surface. The track from Sandleheath down the hill has been completed and is a great improvement. Work has now started along the bottom where the stepping stones were, and work is scheduled to be completed by April '26 if not before. There is no alternative route for horse and bicycle but there are various footpaths to still enable walks between the villages. The inconvenience will be worth the outcome. **Annie Bellows**.

Damerham Phone Box

From Loise Cordelia... As a freelance artist, I specialise in responding to unusual briefs, so when I saw the opportunity to create an art installation inside an iconic K6 phone box, I knew immediately that I wanted to submit a proposal. The more that I researched Damerham's history, the more fascinated I became. While working, I immersed myself in the British History podcast, which gives a brilliant account of Anglo-Saxon history, including King Alfred the Great and his daughter, sometimes known as Aethelflaed of Damerham. The legendary warrior queen presides over the whole installation. Interestingly, there is quite a lot of evidence to



suggest that she actually led troops in battle, but more importantly than that, she was every bit of her father's daughter in her use of strategy and peaceful diplomacy. I was extremely grateful for the input and suggestions I received from local residents, who helped me work out which imagery to include in the rest of the design. On each tier of the rotating 'bookshelf' plinth, I added some low relief textural and 3D elements, to add tactile interest, especially with visually impaired visitors in mind. Creating a short film about the project has meant that many more people all over the UK and beyond now know about the installation and its significance, and I hope it will bring curious visitors to Damerham in the future. Alice Louisa is the final artist working on the phone box commission with Culture in Common titled 'Still Connected'. She will be creating the work in Damerham between December and March next year. 'Still Connected' is a photographic and audio-visual installation exploring isolation, particularly during the winter months, when disconnection can often be most deeply felt. Rooted in the voices and landscapes of Damerham, she is hoping for the project to feature portraits and stories of local residents. The final work will be installed inside the Damerham Telephone Box, transforming it into an intimate listening space combining portraits and recorded voices. She is looking now for people to work with, talk with and take photographs of to include in the installation.
